All Are Welcome At The Table

"Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ." These are the opening words of many of the Apostle Paul's letters to many churches. And so, it is with Paul's first letter to the church in Corinth. In this letter, which we heard portions of in February, Paul was responding to the rumors he'd heard about the many dissensions between the members of the church. However, one of the topics not covered in the text we used is the Lord's Supper. (1 Corinthians 11:17-34)

For me, the Lord's Supper (also called Holy Communion or the Eucharist) is an important part of worship and faith. Before I could take Communion, I had to be confirmed and, for me, confirmation class was three years! Today, however, in the United Church of Christ and other protestant denominations, all are welcome at the table, confirmed or not, member of a specific church or not. We have come to understand that the Communion Table is God's table, not mine or the churches. God invites everyone to the meal.

The belief that one must complete a series of lessons before taking Holy Communion comes, in part, from Paul's letter. In the church in Corinth, the ritual observance of Jesus' last supper was combined with a community meal. But there were problems and Paul addressed them writing, "When you come together, it is not really to eat the Lord's supper. For when the time comes to eat, each of you goes ahead with your own supper, and one goes hungry and another becomes drunk. What! Do you not have homes to eat and drink in? Or do you show contempt for the church of God and humiliate those who have nothing?" Paul goes on to say, "Whoever, therefore, eats the bread or drinks the cup of the Lord in an unworthy manner will be answerable for the body and blood of the Lord...For all who eat and drink without discerning the body, eat and drink judgment against themselves."

Just what did Paul mean about *discerning the body*? For some denominations, this means that unless the person eating and drinking understands that the bread and wine are transformed into (transubstantiation), or are in, with, and under (consubstantiation), or represent symbolically Christ's sacrificial body and blood, that person could not/should not partake in the Lord's Supper. And the church allowing someone to partake without proper understanding is wrong and causes the person to sin. Whew! Who wants to be responsible for another's sin? However, there is another understanding of *discerning the body*. What if the body in question is not so much that of Christ's sacrificial body but rather the church, the church as the body of Christ. Paul was angry. "What should I say to you? Should I commend you? In this matter, I do not commend you." (1 Cor. 11-22b) He was angry because the members were not eating together. They were not sharing equally in the nourishment, physical and spiritual. The United Church of Christ Book of Worship puts it this way:

Recent biblical scholarship...recognizes in Paul's words not a concern for a cognitive understanding of sacramental presence but a concern for an experience of the body of Christ present in the community of faith that Christ gathers as the church."

With this communal understanding, in which discernment is primarily a recognition of belonging and not merely a matter of intellectual comprehension, adult Christians are urged to ask "whether, by excluding children from the Lord's Supper, we are not equally guilty [with the offending Corinthians] of failing to 'discern the body', and, therefore, of endangering the reality of the supper."

And, for me, there is one more reason for saying, "All are welcome at the table." The Lord's Supper is a sacrament of the church. A sacrament is the outward and visible sign of the invisible grace of God. It is an act of God, not of humans. If someone presents themselves at the table, I will serve them. God is the judge as to what's in their heart. Amen.

When Toil is Not Your Portion

Kaji Douša, Senior Pastor of The Park Avenue Christian Church, a congregation of the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) and the United Church of Christ, in New York City (2/11/2025)

[Jesus asked,] "Now why do you all worry about clothing? Consider the lilies of the field, how they grow; they neither labor nor spin... So do not worry about tomorrow, for tomorrow has worries of its own. Sufficient is the trouble of this day." - Matthew 6:28 & 34 (as translated in Year B, pg 303)

"Why do you worry?" Jesus asks. The question, at first, seems annoying. I worry because there are things to worry about.

Pushing past my frustration with his question, I come to understand this: Jesus challenges us to reframe our fears and prioritize joy, peace, and faith.

This isn't just personal—it's political. Choosing to trust in God disrupts systems of fear and toil, making space for liberation and justice.

My mother, a SNCC organizer, reminded me of this through a phrase they would often share with each other after the end of a long, dangerous day of organizing: "My cotton bag is heavy." Which put things into perspective for me. While things may be hard, I am not living under the toil my ancestors did. I do not have to pick cotton.

There is violence in toil. But there's also a resilience that we can draw upon. Our ancestors' toil reminds us that progress is not guaranteed; it requires faith, action, and collective care.

This may feel hard to imagine. You may find yourself in despair. But even there, we remember: God remains on the throne. Healing, and renewing. No matter what.
